ASH WEDNESDAY

Ash Wednesday begins the Christian's Lenten journey with a reminder of our mortality and a call to repentance. The ancient practice of imposing ashes on the foreheads of Christians gives Ash Wednesday its name; the church father Tertullian (c. 160-215 AD) writes of the practice as a public expression of repentance and of our human frailty that stands in need of Christ. Repentance over sin and our need for forgiveness are the primary emphases of worship on Ash Wednesday. This focus is distinct from the other midweek services offered during Lent, which focus on the historical account of Jesus' suffering and death.

PRAYER IN PREPARATION FOR TODAY'S WORSHIP

Almighty and merciful God, work in me as I walk the final steps with my Savior on his journey to the cross. Create in me such a new and contrite heart that I may truly repent of my sins and obtain your full and gracious pardon. Remind me tonight that I am but dust and ashes without my Savior Jesus. In his name I pray. Amen.


THANK OFFERING

INTRODUCTION TO LENT

M: Brothers and sisters in Christ, God created us to know joy in communion with him, to love all humanity, and to live in harmony with all creation. But sin separates us from God, our neighbors, and creation, and so we do not enjoy the life our Creator intended for us. By our sin we grieve our Father, who does not desire us to come under his judgment but to turn to him and live. Therefore, God in his mercy has

sent our Lord Jesus Christ to take our place under the law, to suffer for us, and to die the death we deserve. God made Jesus, who had no sin, to be sin for us so that in him, we might become the righteousness of God.

During the 40 days of Lent, we fix our eyes on Jesus, the Author and Perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of God. The time of Lent reminds us that to know Christ and the power of his resurrection, we must also know the fellowship of sharing in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death. As disciples of the Lord Jesus, we are called to struggle against everything that leads us away from love of God and neighbor.

I invite you, therefore, to confess your sins, ask our Father for forgiveness, and commit yourselves to this struggle. Let us be silent. Let us be still. Let us pause now for a time of reflection and self-examination. (silent self-examination)

CONFESSION

- M: Most holy and merciful Father,
- C: We confess to you and to one another that we have sinned by our own fault, by our own grievous fault in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone.
- M: We have not loved you with our whole heart and mind and strength.
- C: We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.
- M: We have not forgiven others as we have been forgiven.
- C: Have mercy on us, Lord.
- M: We have been deaf to your call to serve as Christ served us.
- C: We have not been true to the mind of Christ.
- M: We have grieved the Holy Spirit.
- C: Have mercy on us, Lord.
- M: We confess to you, Lord, all our past unfaithfulness.
- C: The pride, hypocrisy, and impatience in our lives -

- M: We confess to you, Lord, our self-indulgent appetites and ways, our manipulation of other people,
- C: Our anger when our selfish aims are denied and our envy of those more fortunate than ourselves.
- M: We confess to you, Lord, our love of worldly goods and comforts,
- C: Our dishonesty in daily life and work,
- M: We confess to you, Lord, our failure to show the faith that is in us,
- C: Our negligence in worship and prayer,
- M: Forgive us, Lord, for the wrongs we have done.
- C: For our blindness to human need and suffering and our indifference to injustice and cruelty,
- M: Forgive us, Lord, for all false judgments, for uncharitable thoughts toward others,
- C: For our prejudice and contempt for those who differ from us,
- M: Forgive us, Lord, for what we think, say, or do that is at variance with your will,
- C: For failure to think, say, or do as you have commanded us,
- M: Restore us, good Lord, and let your anger depart from us.
- C: Hear us, Lord, for your mercy is great.
- M: Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, does not desire the death of sinners but rather that they turn from their wickedness and live. Therefore, in the name of the Father, Son + and Holy Spirit, I forgive you all your sins. You are a new creation!
 - During these days of Lent, let us implore God to give us renewal and his Holy Spirit. May we continue to abide in the true faith and at the last be received by him through the merits of Jesus Christ our Lord.

FIRST LESSON Isaiah 59:12-20

¹²Yes, our rebellious deeds are many before you, and our sins testify against us.

Our rebellious deeds are with us,

and as for our guilty deeds, we are aware of them.

¹³Those deeds are rebellion and treachery against the Lord.

We turn back from following our God.

We incite oppression and apostasy.

We conceive and mutter deceitful words from our hearts.

¹⁴Justice is turned back,

and righteousness stands far away, for truth stumbles in the city square, and honesty cannot enter it.

¹⁵The truth is missing,

and anyone who turns from evil makes himself prey.

The Lord looked and saw something evil—there was no justice.

He dressed in garments for vengeance,

and he wrapped himself with zeal like a cloak.

He will repay even the distant coastlands.

¹⁹From the west they will fear the Lord's name, and from the rising of the sun they will fear his glory, for he will come like a raging river, driven by the Spirit of the Lord. ²⁰Then a redeemer will come for Zion and for those in Jacob who turn from rebellion. This is the declaration of the Lord.

SECOND LESSON 2 Corinthians 7:8-13a

⁸For even if I caused you sorrow with my letter, I do not regret it (even though I did regret it, for I see that my letter caused you sorrow—yet only for a little while). ⁹Now I rejoice, not because you were made to feel sorrow, but because this sorrow resulted in repentance. Yes, you were made sorry in a godly way. So you were not harmed in any way by us. ¹⁰In fact, godly sorrow produces repentance, which leads to salvation, leaving no regret. On the other hand, worldly sorrow produces death.

¹¹Yes, look what godly sorrow produced in you: what diligence, what eagerness to clear yourself, what indignation, what alarm, what longing, what zeal, what correction! In every way you proved yourselves to be pure in this matter. ¹²So although I wrote to you, it was not because of the one who did what was wrong, or because of the one who was harmed by it. I wrote instead so that your genuine concern for us would be revealed to you in the sight of God. ¹³For that reason we have been comforted.

GOSPEL *Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21*

¹"Be careful that you do not do your righteous works in front of people, so that they will notice. If you do, you have no reward from your Father who is in heaven. ²So whenever you perform acts of mercy, do not sound a trumpet for yourself, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and on the streets to be praised by people. Amen I tell you: They have received their reward. ³Instead, when you perform acts of mercy, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing. ⁴Then your acts of mercy will be in secret, and your Father who sees what is done in secret will reward you.

⁵"Whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites. They love to stand and pray in the synagogues and on the street corners so that they may be seen by people. Amen I tell you: They have received their reward. ⁶But whenever you pray, go into your private room, close your door, and pray to your Father who is unseen. And your Father, who sees what others cannot see, will reward you.


¹⁶"Whenever you fast, do not make yourself look sad like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces to show everyone that they are fasting. Amen I tell you: They have received their reward. ¹⁷But when you fast, anoint your head and wash

your face, ¹⁸so that it is not apparent to people that you are fasting, but only to your Father who sees what is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you.

¹⁹"Do not store up treasures for yourselves on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. ²⁰But store up treasures for yourselves in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. ²¹Because where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

His Final Steps Led to a Fig Tree

¹²The next day, after they had set out from Bethany, Jesus was hungry. ¹³When he saw a fig tree in leaf in the distance, he went to see if he might find anything on it. When he came to it, he found nothing but leaves, since it was not the season for figs. ¹⁴Jesus said to it, "May no one ever eat fruit from you again!" And his disciples were listening.

²⁰As they passed by in the morning, they saw the fig tree withered down to the roots. ²¹Peter remembered and said, "Rabbi, look! The fig tree that you cursed has withered."

²²Jesus replied, "Have faith in God. ²³Amen I tell you: Whoever says to this mountain, 'Be lifted up and thrown into the sea,' and does not doubt in his heart, but believes that what he says will happen, it will be done for him. ²⁴Therefore I tell you, everything that you ask for in prayer, believe that you have received it, and it will be yours. ²⁵Whenever you stand praying, if you have anything against anyone, forgive him, so that your Father in heaven may forgive you your sins."

CONFESSION OF FAITH

The Second Article of the Apostles' Creed

All: I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell. The third day he rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty. From there he will come to judge the living and the dead.

M: What does this mean?

All: I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the virgin Mary, is my Lord. He has redeemed me, a lost and condemned creature, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil, not with gold or silver but with his holy, precious blood and with his innocent suffering and death. All this he did that I should be his own, and live under him in his kingdom, and serve him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as he has risen from death and lives and rules eternally. This is most certainly true.

"The one who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly. The one who sows generously will also reap generously. Each one should give as he has determined in his heart, not reluctantly or under pressure, for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor 9:6,7).

The Sacrament

Our Lord Jesus has given us a holy supper in which we receive his true body and blood for the forgiveness of sins and the strengthening of our faith. In this supper we also bear witness to the fellowship we share as confessors of the truth, and we proclaim his death until he returns. See p.156 in the hymnal for preparation.

M: Our compassionate and almighty God calls us in mercy to repentance and renewal this Lenten season. The gospel is the source and power of that renewal. Therefore, with recognition of our need for forgiveness and God's gracious gift of the gospel in the body and blood of his Son in the Sacrament, we approach his table with repentant and thankful hearts.

WORDS OF INSTITUTION

M: Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the night he was betrayed, took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take and eat; this is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Then he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me."




DISTRIBUTION

LORD'S PRAYER


